Each day of the NYPDP was filled with valuable insights and learning experiences.

Day 1: The program began with ice-breaking activities that encouraged teamwork and helped build connections in a relaxed setting. This was followed by an insightful session by Dr. Saravanan Raj, who spoke about emerging competencies, job opportunities, and research priorities in Agricultural Extension.

Day 2: The day started with an informative session by Dr. Manjunath B. L., Senior Scientist at ICAR-Central Arid Zone Research Institute, who shared his expertise on livelihood development and the necessary competencies for extension personnel. Dr. Sreeram Vishnu, Assistant Professor at Kerala Agricultural University, introduced us to social network analysis in behavioural research. Later, Dr. Meghajit Sharma from the Alliance of Biodiversity International and CIAT, Bengaluru, provided deep insights into research on gender equality and social inclusion in agriculture. Overall, it was a highly informative day in the areas of livelihood research and network analysis.



Day 3: Dr. Vikram Koundinya and Sravani Reddy discussed Ms. various career pathways and opportunities in extension education abroad. This was followed bv Dr. Suchiradipta Bhattacharjee, Policy Engagement Specialist at IWMI, who shared her experiences in policymaking, relevant courses, as well as fellowships internship and opportunities.

Day 4: The day began with an engaging session on bibliometric analysis by Dr. S. Rahalya, MANAGE Fellow, who also explained systematic literature reviews and research publication strategies. Dr. P.V.K. Shasidhar, Professor at the School of Extension and Development Studies, IGNOU, New Delhi, then delivered an in-depth session on monitoring and evaluation (M&E) for extension projects. He also provided a live demonstration of how to conduct focus group discussions, an essential competency in agricultural extension research.

Day 5: Dr. Mahesh Chander, Principal Scientist at IVRI, delivered a powerful session on entrepreneurship, gender equality in agricultural extension, and the importance of organic farming. He was followed by Mr. Srajesh Gupta, Manager of Climate Change Research at AKRSP, Gujarat, who discussed climate change, market opportunities, and policy advocacy in agricultural extension.

Training Experience


