Empowered to Extend: A Scholar's Diary from MANAGE NYPDP

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Key Learnings

Discussions revolved around bridging curriculum gaps, job opportunities, and professional specialization. Brainstorming on the challenges faced by extension scholars and faculty was both eye-opening and empowering. Dr. Saravanan Raj set the tone with the powerful quote, "The world believes in action," introducing us to cutting-edge research priorities in agricultural extension, including climate change, digital innovation, urban agriculture, and gender studies. Dr. Rasheed Sulaiman V further broadened our perspective on the new capacities required in extension, emphasizing the importance of adaptive roles and policy engagement. Dr. P. Sethuraman Sivakumar's session on research methodologies provided a deep dive into scale development, measurement tools, and scientific research goals. We learned how clarity and creativity can blend with robust methodologies to produce impactful research.



Dr. Krithika Sundaram emphasized the evolving role of knowledge management (KM) in the development sector, especially within NGOs. She introduced us to the core components of KM, knowledge creation, storage, sharing, and application, and highlighted its role in driving innovation, effective project implementation, and social science research.

The session emphasized growing career opportunities in NGOs and development organizations, and the critical skillsets young professionals need today: communication, facilitation, data handling, systems thinking, and digital literacy. Dr. Krithika also shed light on the scope of Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) as an emerging space for development professionals to make a meaningful impact. This session helped us understand how KM and interdisciplinary competencies can bridge the gap between research and real-world development outcomes.

Dr. Meghajit Sharma delivered a thought-provoking session on gender studies, emphasizing its critical relevance in agricultural extension. He highlighted how gender dynamics influence access to resources, decision-making, and participation in agricultural development. The session shed light on the often-overlooked contributions of women in farming systems and the need for gender-sensitive approaches in extension research and practice. Dr. Meghajit stressed the importance of integrating gender perspectives into policy formulation, program planning, and capacity-building initiatives to ensure inclusive and equitable agricultural growth. His session encouraged us to critically analyze existing extension frameworks and work toward creating systems that recognize and empower all genders equally in the agricultural landscape.



Dr. P.V.K. Sasidhar's session on Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) illuminated how M&E is not just a technical task but a strategic tool for accountability, reflection, and progress. We explored logical frameworks, Bennett's Hierarchical Model, and input-output frameworks.
