Participated in the MANAGE-NYPDP at MANAGE Hyderabad during June 09-13, 2025.





Day 1 (June 9, 2025): The program began with an overview of MANAGE's vision and legacy, followed by speed networking which helped break the ice. I gained a comprehensive understanding of new competencies and global job opportunities in agricultural extension from Dr. Saravanan Raj Sir.



The session on gender in agriculture, social inclusion, and monitoring & evaluation by Dr. Meghajit Sharma made me aware of the critical role of inclusivity in research and practice. The "World Café" activity provided an engaging way to reflect on challenges in extension.

Day 2 (June 10, 2025): This day emphasized the transformative role of ICTs in agriculture. Dr. Saravanan Raj's session helped me understand the digital skillsets needed in extension. I learned about value chain advisory services, innovative research scaling methods, and ecological agriculture. The sessions by Dr. Ramanjaneyulu on community sustainable extension and Dr. Rasheed Sulaiman on policy engagement provided insights into system-level approaches for impactful extension.

Day 3 (June 11, 2025): We visited Access Livelihoods Consulting, where I observed real-life models of community-led extension and entrepreneurship. Dr. Mahesh Chander's session focused on organic farming and gender-equitable entrepreneurship, reinforcing inclusive development strategies. In the evening, Dr. Saravanan Raj explained the significance of agri-innovation and incubation, followed by insights on indigenous food systems by Ms. Divina Matla.

Day 4 (June 12, 2025): This day was all about career avenues in extension, with enriching sessions on graduate study opportunities in the USA, experiences from NGOs, KVKs, and FPOs. Dr. Arun Balamatti's talk outlined practical strategies and research priorities in agricultural extension. The visit to C-DAC Hyderabad introduced us to advanced technologies like AI, blockchain, and big data applications in agriculture, which was truly futuristic and inspiring.

Day 5 (June 13, 2025): We explored emerging research trends, monitoring & evaluation competencies and conducted a hands-on Focus Group Discussion (FGD) exercise. It was very practical and improved my understanding of field-level data collection. The final sessions included sharing insights, drafting action plans, and discussing how agri-tech startups are revolutionizing agriculture
