Key Learnings



Day 1 – Laying the Foundation: Introduction, Competencies, and Gender in Agriculture

The inaugural day of the MANAGE NYPDP program laid a strong foundation, setting the stage for a comprehensive understanding of the evolving landscape of agricultural extension. The introductory sessions, rooted in MANAGE's esteemed vision and legacy, resonated deeply and fostered a profound sense of pride in becoming part of such a prestigious initiative.

The program's inauguration, graced by the inspiring and motivational presence of Dr. Sagar Hanuman Singh, Director General, MANAGE, further amplified this sentiment, setting an optimistic tone for the days ahead. A key takeaway from the first day was the strong emphasis on the growing demand for new competencies in agricultural extension. This includes a broad spectrum of skills, from essential digital literacy and effective innovation management to the adoption of participatory approaches, highlighting the shift toward a more dynamic and inclusive extension paradigm.

Dr. Saravanan Raj's insightful session shed light on the expanding job opportunities in both international and domestic organizations, painting a promising picture of career pathways in this evolving field.

Complementing this, Dr. Meghajit Sharma's illuminating discussion on gender equality and inclusion, significantly broadened my perspective, emphasizing the need to integrate social dimensions into agricultural research and development initiatives. The day concluded with a highly engaging World Café exercise, an interactive learning experience where peer discussions enriched my understanding of the complex challenges faced at the grassroots level in agricultural communities. Overall, the first day not only provided a solid theoretical framework but also sparked critical awareness of the social and practical complexities inherent in agricultural extension.

Day 2 – Embracing the Future: Digital Extension, Value Chains, and Sustainable Communities

The second day of the program marked a deep dive into the technological and innovation-driven dimensions of agricultural extension. Sessions focused on Information and Communication Technologies (ICTs) and digital competencies were particularly enlightening, clearly demonstrating that the scope of extension has evolved far beyond traditional field visits. It became evident that modern extension now involves the strategic use of mobile applications, data-driven platforms, and advanced virtual advisory systems, signalling a transformative shift in how knowledge and support reach farmers.



A major highlight of the day was Dr. Sethuraman Sivakumar's compelling discourse on the measurement and scaling of social research, which provided invaluable clarity on how evidence-based models can be leveraged for large-scale community impact.

Adding to the day's richness were two impactful sessions by Dr. Ramanjaneyulu, who masterfully introduced the concepts of community sustainable extension and ecological agriculture. These discussions aligned closely with the global climate-smart agriculture movement, emphasizing the critical need for environmentally conscious and sustainable farming practices. Equally impactful was Dr. Rasheed Sulaiman's session on policy engagement, which proved eye-opening. It highlighted the often-underrecognized role of extension professionals in shaping evidence-based policies that can drive meaningful transformation in the agricultural sector.

Collectively, these sessions redefined my understanding of agricultural extension as a truly interdisciplinary field—one that demands a balanced integration of technical and interpersonal skills, innovation, policy awareness, and, most importantly, empathy for the communities it seeks to empower.



Day 3 – Bridging Theory and Practice: Field Visit, Organic Farming, and Entrepreneurship

Day three brought a much-anticipated shift from theoretical discussions to a more grounded, practical experience, bridging classroom learning with real-world applications. The visit to Access Livelihoods Consulting (ALC) was truly eye-opening, offering a firsthand look at the tangible impact of extension services. Witnessing how ALC is transforming the lives of over 65,000 marginalized producers was both inspiring and deeply moving, reaffirming belief in the transformative power of effective extension. The key takeaways from this immersive field visit were both numerous and profound. Foremost was the critical importance of community-led models in driving sustainable livelihood development, underscoring the power of empowering local communities to shape their own futures.



Dr. Mahesh Chander's session organic farming and equality further aender reinforced this idea. highlighting real-world examples of how empowering women farmers leads significant positive change within agricultural communities.

Dr. Saravanan Raj's discussion on incubation and startups was particularly insightful, revealing the vast and often untapped potential of agri-tech entrepreneurship to revolutionize the agricultural sector.

The day concluded with a heartfelt presentation on indigenous food systems, serving as a powerful reminder of the immense value of local knowledge and its vital role in designing effective, culturally grounded extension initiatives. This day was instrumental in bridging the gap between theory and practice, powerfully illustrating that inclusive innovation is not just a concept, but the future of agricultural development.

Day 4 - Charting Future Paths: Career Insights and Visit to C-DAC

The fourth day of the MANAGE NYPDP program was distinctly career-oriented and forward-looking, offering invaluable insights into future pathways in agricultural extension. The morning sessions featured engaging interactions with alumni who have successfully established themselves in global institutions, providing a rare and enriching glimpse into international education and research opportunities in the agricultural sector. Additionally, Dr. Arun Balamatti's sharing of experiences from his work with NGOs and Krishi Vigyan Kendras (KVKs) provided a comprehensive understanding of pluralistic extension systems operating across diverse organizational frameworks.

The highlight of the day was undoubtedly the visit to C-DAC Hyderabad, a truly transformative experience. Gaining firsthand exposure to the cutting-edge applications of Artificial Intelligence (AI), big data, and blockchain in agriculture was awe-inspiring. It showcased how advanced technologies can revolutionize rural development and extension services. This pivotal day not only broadened my understanding of the sector but also reshaped my personal and professional aspirations. Additionally, presentations on various agri-tech startups showcased the immense potential of technology in democratizing access to extension services, making vital support and information more accessible to a broader farming community.

The program concluded with a comprehensive wrap-up and action plan session. It also fostered a strong sense of collective purpose and commitment to driving positive change in our respective fields.
