It was an engaging and insightful experience that strengthened my qualitative research skills and prepared me to apply FGDs effectively in field-level assessments and participatory rural appraisals.





- Bibliometric Analysis: Gained exposure to bibliometric analysis, a valuable tool for mapping research trends, identifying knowledge gaps, and supporting evidence-based academic publishing.
- Inclusion and Empowerment: Understood the importance of GEYSI (Gender Equality, Youth, and Social Inclusion) in program design, promoting inclusive, equitable, and youth-driven development.
- Livelihood and Entrepreneurship: Gained exposure to livelihood promotion strategies and entrepreneurship models that are critical for rural development and economic resilience.
- Practical Exposure: The visit to NRCC (National Research Centre on Camel)
 offered firsthand experience in livestock extension, demonstrating innovations
 in camel health, breeding, and value chain development.


Action Plan
