From Doubts to Dreams: My NYPDP Agri-Extension Journey

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NYPDP was not just a training program, it was an enriching journey that redefined the way I perceive Agricultural Extension. These five days were nothing short of transformative. From the very first moment on the serene MANAGE campus, surrounded by greenery, a peaceful ambiance, and welcoming facilities, I knew this was going to be something special.

Each day lit a new spark. Every session opened doors to ideas, competencies, and career pathways I never knew existed within my own discipline. Often, we found ourselves whispering, *"This too is a part of Extension?"*, a mix of surprise and realization that our field is far more vast and vibrant than we thought.

Key Learnings

Day 1 – Cultural Harmony in Action

We can be changemakers. This shifted my outlook: from merely studying problems to actively designing solutions for society.

The field visit brought theory to life. Meeting changemakers who created real impact in their communities helped us realize, "we too can." What we often lack is exposure and that initial push. This program provided both, nurturing our belief in ourselves.

Day 4 – Where There's a Will, There's a Way

Until now, many of us felt restricted by financial limitations, family norms, or social expectations. But interacting with those who overcame these very hurdles proved that such barriers are not permanent. They are challenges meant to be faced, not feared. "Opportunities are plenty, we just need to explore, act, and believe."



Day 5 – Celebrate Your Subject



On the final day, Dr. Saravanan Raj, Director (Agricultural Extension), MANAGE, said something that deeply resonated with all of us: "This program wasn't training. It was a celebration week of your subject."

And indeed, it was. For the first time, many of us felt proud, confident, and emotionally connected to AGRICULTURAL EXTENSION, a subject often undervalued by others, and sometimes even by ourselves, which is now our source of inspiration and purpose.
