# MANAGE-ing in MANAGE

I am Ishika Gautam from Varanasi, Uttar Pradesh and completed Masters in Agricultural Extension Education from Sam Higginbottom University of Agriculture, Technology and Sciences (SHUATS), Prayagraj, Uttar Pradesh.

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"There are journeys you plan, and then there are journeys that plan you. MANAGE was the latter -it didn't just change my career direction; it transformed the person I



was becoming."

One fair day, while having my lunch, I got a call, a call from MANAGE for an interview. I was stunned. So many people had applied, including some from my own circle, and here I was, getting the call. It felt surreal. Even after the interview, I didn't believe I'd make it. I kept thinking, "There are so many intelligent people out there... 10 were selected for the interview... why would they pick me?" But...

when I received the selection letter, I wasn't just surprised, I was overwhelmed with emotion. That day, I realized something: "Never look down on yourself. You never know when opportunity will knock. Just stay ready, stay eager, keep learning, and be true to yourself."

Arriving in Hyderabad with a suitcase full of clothes and a heart full of dreams, I stepped into the MANAGE campus not knowing that this place would become a second home. When I first heard about the internship opportunity at MANAGE, Hyderabad, I felt a rush of hope and a little nervousness. I had just completed my post-graduation in Agricultural Extension Education and was still figuring out my next steps. What did I truly want? What direction was I heading in?.



I applied for the 'MANAGE Internship for Post-Graduate Students of Agricultural Extension 2024-2025' with a clear motive; "I want to gain real and meaningful research experience from a prestigious institution." I had no idea that this journey would challenge me, push me, reshape my mindset, and gift me experiences that textbooks could never teach. Before joining, I thought it would be like my M.Sc. thesis; structured, predictable, maybe a bit mechanical. I also thought, "Well, at least I'll get to chill in Hyderabad!". But life had something else in store, something deeper, more powerful.

### A Tough Start, A Beautiful Transformation

I won't lie, the beginning was tough. Starting at 9 a.m. sharp and working 7–8 hours straight felt like a marathon. At times, I missed my comfort zone. But slowly, I began to understand the value of discipline. We had our own fully air-conditioned vault, undisturbed, focused, where we were trusted to work independently. No micromanaging, just our mentor, Dr. Saravanan Raj, visiting occasionally to check our progress and gently push us beyond our limits. He used to say, *"You are not just interns, you are thinkers, creators, leaders."* 



### The Work that Changed Me



At MANAGE, we weren't treated like interns doing routine tasks in some corporate cubicle. We were involved, trusted, and challenged. I remember how Dr. Saravanan Raj, Director (Agricultural Extension) would take us on walks through the serene MANAGE campus. Those weren't just strolls, they were classrooms. Life lessons were tucked into nature, and leadership was taught through casual conversations. We attended lectures and programs happening on campus to gain exposure, interact with influential people, and learn how to conduct events. We weren't just confined to research, we co-hosted *Saturday Webinars*, conducted *Evening4Learning* sessions, coordinated with trainees, and even made promotional videos. I surprised myself when I realized, "Wait... I can do this too?".



One standout moment was coordinating a visit for officers and farmers from Odisha with another intern. Initially, I panicked, "I'm just a girl... can I even handle this?" But Dr. Saravanan Raj believed in me. And slowly, I believed in myself too. "That day, I discovered the leader within me, not loud, not aggressive, but calm, prepared, and more confident than ever."

Working on my topic, "Seeds of Success: Empowering Youth to Thrive in Agripreneurship", I learned how to conduct systematic literature reviews, explore modern trends, use research software, and go beyond traditional methods. I also learned how to interact with people clearly, understand the deeper layers of data, and present ideas effectively. My confidence grew every time I spoke.



## Realigning my Dreams

Before this internship, I had no intention of pursuing a PhD. I thought I'd drift into something else. But these three months changed that. The exposure, interactions, and sense of purpose brought me closer to my field, and my future. We were constantly encouraged to connect and interact with experts and professionals, giving me insights into the global landscape. Networking became less scary and more empowering.

Working under the incredible mentorship of Dr. Saravanan Raj, Director (Agricultural Extension), MANAGE, was like unlocking a new lens to view the world. Every conversation with him lit a spark.

He didn't just guide us, he empowered us. - *Purpose*: For the first time, I saw myself pursuing a PhD in Agricultural Extension Education with a clear vision.


