Rooted in Research, Growing Through Experience: My Internship at MANAGE

I am Sakshi Pundir, from Himachal Pradesh and completed Masters in Agricultural Extension Education from Dr. Rajendra Prasad Central Agricultural University (RPCAU), Pusa, and Bihar.





My motivation to apply for the MANAGE internship stemmed from a deep desire to expand my understanding of agricultural extension, particularly under the mentorship of the renowned extensionist Dr. Saravanan Raj. His pioneering work in digital extension, capacity building, and innovative outreach strategies has always inspired me. I saw this internship as a golden opportunity to directly learn from his visionary insights and contribute meaningfully to the field.

Moreover, MANAGE's reputation as a national-level apex institute with a strong academic and practical framework made it the ideal place to bridge my classroom learning with field-level applications. As a master's research scholar focusing on the "Agricultural Extension System in Himachal Pradesh," I was especially keen to explore diverse extension models and policies that could enrich my thesis and overall academic development.

#### **Internship Experience**

My responsibilities also involved data collection, thematic coding, and summarizing best practices from other states for potential replication in Himachal Pradesh.

One challenge was the vast amount of data I had to review and synthesize within tight deadlines. Balancing literature review, field insights, and policy analysis was mentally demanding. However, time management techniques, prioritization, and peer discussions helped me stay on track. Another challenge was adapting to a new work environment and understanding the expectations at a national-level institution. But with consistent support from the team and a proactive attitude, I adapted quickly and became more confident and efficient in my tasks.
