Oobleck

"The Science of Today is the Technology of Tomorrow"

Oobleck is the name given to the suspension of corn-starch mixed in water in a 1.5-2:1 ratio. It is a classic example for Non-Newtonian fluid other than blood, ketchup, quicksand, etc. Newtonian fluids like water and milk, Unlike Oobleck reacts differently when stress or pressure is applied. The colloid corn-starch particles, around the location of impact, freeze at a speed proportional to the force applied; meaning they stop higher momentum in a very short time. The more pressure you apply the faster they thicken making it impenetrable. So the only way to reach deeper easily is by just letting anything freefall (zero pressure).

Current Uses

Currently, Oobleck is commercialised as a plaything for kids in which safe colouring substances are added. The melting of Oobleck in hand is quite a unique feeling. It is also used in certain fun arenas where a pool of Oobleck (around 1500 gallons) is prepared by mixing in huge cement mixers. The pool, though liquid, gives a unique experience for people to walk, run, jump, dance and do anything on it as long as they don't stop.



Future Prospects

The properties of Oobleck are still astonishing to scientists around the globe and efforts have been made to explore more of its uses. Most prominent of them is the one where they are trying to replace Kevlar, which are heavier and

heat up faster in dry environments and thereby tire our war heroes easily, with Oobleck. Kevlar, though stops bullet penetration, still can bruise. Ten layers of Oobleck gel can withstand better than 31 layers of a regular Kevlar suit.



Oobleck also is considered as an alternative for polyethylene for packing purposes. Though provide better protection they polyethylene and are environmental friendly, factor is an issue here. Engineers have cost provided the option for considering Oobleck as a perfect material for sealing purposes in case of emergency as they can resist larger forces even better. They have been even suggested for the tragic BP Oil Spill incident of 2010 where the oil leak from the rigs was uncontrollable. Scientists have suggested Oobleck to be mixed with mud to counter the leak. They also have the potential to replace airbags that can injure the driver; Oobleck can slow down the impact.

Conclusion

Though Oobleck is at an experimental stage, it tends to be a promising commercial product in the near future. Once commercialized, the demand for corn flour could take a new direction. It's quite a fascinating fact that something as simple as corn flour can have such a wide scope in the defense and safety applications. As long as man sets no limits this imagination, pretty much anything is possible.


